

Dr. Michael Carius is a clinical associate professor in the Department of Emergency Medicine and Traumatology at the University of Connecticut School of Medicine. He is also the former chairman of the Department of Emergency Medicine at St. Vincent's Medical Center and Norwalk Hospital, in Connecticut. He has worked there for a combined twenty seven years. Originally from Morton, Illinois, Dr. Carius graduated from Trinity College, in Hartford, Connecticut with a bachelors degree. From there, he attended the University of Colorado's School of Medicine, earning his MD, going on to intern at the San Diego Naval Regional Medical Center. Afterwards, he worked internationally in the U.S. Navy as a general medical officer, first on the USS Piedmont and then at the Naval Hospital in Naples, Italy; he learned his love for emergency medicine during this time. Next, he transferred to the US Air Force to become a flight surgeon, working in the UK at RAF Lakenheath and Mildenhall, before completing his Emergency Medicine Residency at USC, and then returning to Connecticut. He continues to work as a staff emergency physician at Bridgeport Hospital. Dr. Carius has been deeply involved with organized medicine, having previously been president of both the American College of Emergency Physicians and the Connecticut College of Emergency Physicians, as well as past president and now senior director of the American Board of Emergency Medicine. He is also the current chair of the board of directors of the American Board of Medical Specialties. He has also been a delegate to the American Medical Association's House of Delegates for twenty years, currently serving as the chair of the Connecticut Delegation.
